3 and he had title to the house, even though it was fully  
4 mortgaged.

5 Q. As you look back on your entire history with the criminal  
6 proceedings and the civil litigation, Mr. Dawkins, in your  
7 judgment, do you think that the results would have been as  
8 positive as they were, if you wouldn't have had the assistance  
9 that you got from Ms. Sue Bell throughout those proceedings?

10 A. Mr. Durand, that's a hard question to answer, because I  
11 guess it's speculative in a way. Nobody will really know, but  
12, she was helpful to me in communicating with her father and  
13 convincing him that he needed to cooperate to help himself.  
14 Doing that by myself would have been a much more difficult  
15 task.

16 You know, she also speeded things up when things needed to  
17 be done, because if I had had to, you know, communicate with  
18 him directly, it would have been tough. You know, if I needed  
19 to see him, she'd get him in. She'd pick him up and bring him  
20 to my office immediately, if I needed to see him.

21 When he testified in the trial, the lawyer, Bill Lynch,  
22 the first time, that case ended up in a hung jury. The second  
23 time, she and I testified for the government. Her testimony  
24 essentially was that she recognized Mr. Lynch had a conflict.  
25 He couldn't represent Mr. Bell, as well as all these old

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
